#### KSU's Dual Enrollment Honors Program

Students that are interested in applying for admission to Kennesaw State University for their Dual Enrollment Program, the **deadline** is **January 15, 2015** for the Fall semester. Students must have:

- A total SAT score of 1100 (minimum 530 Critical Reading and 530 Math)
- A total ACT score of 24 (minimum 23 English and 22 Math)
- High School academic GPA of at least 3.0 in English, math, science, social studies and foreign language courses.

#### A complete admission file includes:

- A completed application
- \$40 non-refundable on-line application
- Official High School transcript
- Official SAT/ACT scores
- Dual Enrollment Consent Form (mailed with acceptance letter)
- Dual enrollment Policy Statement and Agreement (mailed with acceptance letter)

#### NCAA Clearinghouse

If you wish to participate in NCAA Division I or II athletics, you need to be certified by the NCAA Eligibility Center. You need to qualify academically and you need to be cleared as an amateur student-athlete. Registration should be done at (www.ncaaclearinghouse.net) the beginning of your Junior year. A copy of your transcript must also be sent. Transcript release forms that must be signed by parents, are available in the school counseling office.

During your senior year, you will need to log back in to the NCAA Clearinghouse website to update any new information and to request your final amateurism certification. Please see Mrs. Wright if you have any questions.

#### **HOPE Scholarship**

#### Information

The HOPE Scholarship program is for students who have demonstrated academic achievement and who are seeking a college degree. Currently, there are several ways to become eligible for the HOPE Scholarship, either by graduating from high school as a HOPE Scholar or by earning it while in college.

#### Eligibility

To be eligible as an **entering freshman**, you must:

- Be a U.S. citizen or meet the eligible non-citizen requirements.
- Meet HOPE's Georgia residency requirements.
- Meet the Selective Services registration requirements.
- Must earn a 3.0 cumulative grade point average on a 4.0 scale for all core curriculum coursework.

If you meet eligibility requirements, you may receive first-year HOPE Scholarship assistance for the first 30 semester or 45 quarter hours attempted and at the end of every Spring term for full-time students; or at the end of the first three enrolled terms if you are enrolled as a less than full-time student. The **Zell Miller Scholarship** students must meet the following requirements:

- Earn at least a 3.7 core (courses in English, Math, Science, Social Studies and Foreign Language) GPA.
- Score at least a 1200 on the Math and Critical Reading portions of the SAT in one test administration, or at least a 26 composite score on the ACT.
- Valedictorian or Salutatorian

#### Covers full tuition

The **HOPE Grant** is for students seeking a technical certificate or diploma, regardless of the student's high school GPA. Once accepted, you will need to maintain a 3.0 GPA for HOPE Grant funds to continue.

#### SAT (Scholastic Aptitude Test)/ACT (American College Test)

If you plan to attend college, you need to take either the SAT or ACT this year, usually in the Spring. It is strongly recommended that you take courses to prepare you for these exams. CollegeBoard does prefer that you register online, but we do have registration packets available in the School Counseling Office.

You can also register online at: <a href="www.collegeboard.org">www.collegeboard.org</a> (SAT) and <a href="www.act.org">www.act.org</a> (ACT). Please be sure to include our school code (112745) on your registration form, so that Campbell High School will get a copy of your scores.

If you qualify for **free or reduced lunch**, you can get a fee waiver from your counselor. You can receive two fee waivers for the ACT and two fee waivers for the SAT, during your high school career. You can also receive fee waivers for college applications.

#### Things to do

#### December

• Find out which exams—such as the SAT I, SAT II, and ACT - are required by the colleges to which you plan to apply.

- Register and begin studying for the SAT and ACT exams.
- Sign up with fastweb.com. You will be able to see what scholarships are available to you this year.

#### **January**

- Think about goals for post-secondary plans.
- Make an appointment with Mrs. Sinclair to use the career center.
- Complete the career inventory on Career Cruising.
- Begin to make a preliminary list of colleges you would like to investigate further.
- Surf the internet and use college resources in the career center.

#### **February**

- When you receive your PSAT score report, use the score guide to help you understand and interpret your results.
- Begin assembling your list of colleges/technical/specialty schools.
- Meet with your school counselor to discuss your preliminary list of colleges. Make sure the list meets your
  needs and interests (academic program, size, location, cost, etc.) and whether you are considering colleges
  where you are likely to be admitted. You should be optimistic but also realistic.
- Contact military recruiters if appropriate.
- Start investigating private scholarships and other student aid programs. You may be able to get funding from an organization with which you or your family is affiliated.
- Take/register for the ACT or SAT exam if you haven't already done so.

#### March

- Prepare for and take/retake the graduation Writing test in February
- Contact the colleges on your list to get admission literature and financial aid information. There is no charge and no obligation to obtain general information about admission and financial aid.
- Consider college visits during spring break (April).
- Take/register for the SAT and ACT exams if you haven't already done so.
- Continue studying for the SAT and ACT exams.
- Begin to explore summer programs and/or employment.
- When selecting your senior courses, be sure to continue to challenge yourself academically.
